Tremont Betterment Association is the managing body of the Tremont Turkey Festival. The members of the TBA board are past Turkey Festival General Chairmen. All of the profits of the Tremont Turkey Festival are funneled directly back into our community. One way this happens is at the TBA Disbursement Meeting, which is normally held the third Wednesday in March each year. Any group or individual in the Village of Tremont may submit a request for disbursement of funds. All requests will be subject to vote at the meeting.

To Submit a Request: If you would like to submit a request for disbursement, **download this form**, fill it out, and submit either through mail or email (addresses listed on the form).

- The 2024 request forms <u>must be</u> submitted by March 15, 2024.
- The meeting will be held at 6:00 on March 20, 2024 at the Community Center.

At the Meeting: A representative must be present at the meeting and be prepared with the following:

- Present a 2-3 minute presentation about your request. Items to highlight would be a bit about your organization, how it helps our community, and how many Tremont residents would benefit by your request.
- Answer questions (if any) from Betterment members.
- Representative will leave the meeting after his/her presentation.

After the presentations, the Tremont Betterment Association board members will vote on how the 2023 Tremont Turkey Festival funds will be disbursed.

Disbursements will be mailed out within a week of the meeting, and a notice of all disbursements will be in a Weekly Newsletter soon after the meeting.

On Monday Tremont didn't have school because of Presidents Day, so some kids went out and did community service at The Food Pantry and Serving Senior Meals. Tuesday the dress up theme was FFA colors, the students were supposed to dress up in blue and gold. The activity for that day was the FFA members passed out yellow and blue laffy taffy to students walking into school. Wednesday's dress up theme was camouflage and all the FFA members got donuts in the Ag room that morning. On Thursday the dress up theme was Country vs Country Club, and they held a hay bale toss in the gym during study hall. School Referendum Update

March 19th is drawing closer and early voting has already begun, so it's important to have accurate information about the Tremont School District referendum. Here are some key points:

- The school district is seeking a referendum that would add 0.40% to the current limiting tax rate for the school district. This would increase the district's limiting tax rate from 4.22% to 4.62% for taxes payable in 2025.
- The limiting rate increase would coincide with a projected 0.79% decrease in the bond tax rate (compared to the current year) as the district's building bonds are paid off over a twoyear period. The current year's 0.91% bond rate is projected to be only 0.12% by 2026.
- The projected figures in the chart below illustrate the significant decrease to the bond tax rate over the next three years and the corresponding decrease to the overall tax rate.

0.40% referendum	Current Year	Taxes payable 2024*	Taxes Payable 2025*	Taxes Payable 2026*
Limiting Rate	4.22%	4.09%	4.62%	4.66%
Bond Rate	0.91%	0.84%	0.24%	0.12%

- The overall tax rate will decrease even if the referendum passes because the bond rate is decreasing by more than the limiting rate would be increasing.
- IMPORTANT NOTE -- Language on the ballot will only address the increase to the limiting rate and not the decrease to the bond rate or the overall tax rate. Therefore, the ballot language will make it appear that there will be a tax increase. As explained above, however, while the limiting rate will increase, the overall tax rate will decrease.
- Despite cuts to staff and programs, years of state funding shortfalls created financial issues for the district over time, but the Board of Education was determined to reach this point before seeking a referendum to avoid increasing taxes on residents.
- Passage of the referendum would generate \$700,000 or more new dollars for the district annually and be used for maintaining and enhancing current programs, adding new programs for students, attracting and retaining staff, and upgrades to facilities, safety and security, and technology.

The school district will be hosting an in-person meeting on Tuesday March 12th at 7:00 pm at Tremont High School for anyone with any last minute questions about the referendum.

Did you Know....?

Tremont Community High School and the War Effort Part 3

In 1942 and 1943, students at T.C.H.S. passing between classes would have seen the "Victory" stamp booth in the main floor corridor, which had been patriotically decorated by

Student Council members Dan Koch, Phyllis Bolliger, and Ernie Aberle. The nation was in the midst of WWII and all Americans were encouraged to buy stamps and bonds as a part of their civilian duties on the Homefront.

The U.S. postal service sold savings stamps that, once collected, could be used to purchase a war bond. This money was then used to finance our military. At T.C.H.S, sales were brisk, with stamps sold on Tuesday and Friday mornings and over the noon hour. According to the 1943 Echo yearbook, the average sales were about \$100.00 a week. In 2024 dollars, that amount would equal an impressive \$1,815.07!

Additionally, Tremont's high school students made cribbage boards and felt bookmarks and collected books and magazines. These items were part of their membership in the Jr. Red Cross; donated as part of an effort to boost morale of the patients at Chanute Field Hospital in Rantoul, Illinois.

Thoughts of the war were never far from the students' hearts. Many had brothers or other relatives, as well as older friends who were stationed all around the world, many in dangerous situations. Tremont's high school students were enthusiastically doing their part in the "war effort," as part of the United States Homefront efforts.
